

Current Operations

Tropical Depression Harvey

Situation:

The center of Tropical Depression Harvey was located about 100 miles SE of Shreveport, LA moving toward the NE at 9 mph; maximum sustained winds 35 mph. the National Hurricane Center has issued it's last public advisory on Harvey. (Advisory 43 as of 11:00 p.m. EDT)

Harvey is expected to produce additional rainfall accumulations of 4 to 8 inches from southwestern Louisiana and the adjacent border of eastern Texas northeastward into western Tennessee and Kentucky through Friday with isolated amounts up to 12 inches. The threat of heavy rains has ended in the Houston; however catastrophic and life-threatening flooding will continue in and around Houston, Beaumont/Port Arthur,



and eastward into southwest Louisiana for the rest of the week.

The outer bands of Harvey are expected to produce additional rainfall amounts of 3 to 6 inches over portions of the central and eastern Gulf States and 2 to 4 inches farther north into parts of the Tennessee Valley, Ohio Valley and southern Mid Atlantic through Saturday. These rains may lead to flooding concerns across these areas.

Impacts:

Texas:

- Fatalities/Injuries: No official reports (media reports up to 30 storm related fatalities)
- Search and rescue via boat or helicopter still required throughout flooded areas
- Evacuations: mandatory evacuations ordered for an estimated 779K people; additional 980K under voluntary evacuation orders
- Shelters: Four mega shelters established in Houston and Dallas along with 232 other shelters near affected counties, housing 32,134 people (ESF #6 as of 8:30 a.m. EDT, Aug 30)
- Power outages: 194.2k customers without power in Houston and along the coast (DOE EAGLE-1 as of 1:00 a.m. EDT)
 - o Mutual assistance crews from at least 19 states & nearly 10,000 resources are being dedicated to the response effort
- Over 119k residential homes may be affected (previous estimate 99K) out of 2,239,176 across 24 counties
 - o Over 20,000 residential homes may have major damage (previous estimate 12.9K)
- 22 Hospitals evacuated/closed; 14 hospitals sheltering in place; expect services to gradually resume as flood waters recede
- Communications: 329 of 7,804 (4%) cell sites out of service, 186 additional sites on back-up power
- Airports: George Bush IAP and William P. Hobby airports resumed limited flight operations, expect full service by the weekend
- Oil/Hazardous Materials: 73 oil/HAZMAT incidents reported
- Public Works: Aransas and Calhoun County, TX have no functioning water, sewer or sanitation services

Louisiana:

- Fatalities/Injuries: No official reports
- Evacuations: mandatory evacuations ordered for an estimated 6.9K people; additional 133K under voluntary evacuation orders
- Shelters: 165 sheltered within 4 shelters (ESF #6 as of 8:30 a.m. EDT, Aug 30)
- Power outages: 10.2K customers without power (DOE EAGLE-1 as of 1:00 a.m. EDT)

FEMA/State and Local Response:

FEMA Headquarters:

- More than 2,000 FEMA employees are deployed in support of Tropical Storm Harvey response
- NRCC: Level I, 24/7 with all ESFs and LNOs; NWC: Steady State
- National IMAT West deployed to State EOC, Austin, TX
- National IMAT East-1 deployed to Harris County EOC, Houston, TX
- Regional IMATs: R-II (Corpus Christi), R-V (San Antonio), R-VII (Houston), and R-VIII (Austin)
- Mobile Emergency Response Support (MERS) fielded 27 teams and numerous communications capabilities throughout the impacted area is support of US&R, IMAT, ISB, and survivor assistance
- Urban Search & Rescue (US&R) deployed 28 Task Forces, one Incident Support Team (IST), and seven Hazardous Equipment Push Packages; as of 18:00 EDT System resources operating in theater have saved or assisted 9,632 people and over 1,000 pets
- Logistics: ISBs established in Seguin, TX & Camp Beauregard, LA, a third ISB to open in Randolph, TX
 - o 23 Points of Distribution (PODs) have been established in TX with additional sites being identified
 - o Commodities on hand: 6.7M meals, 7.4M liters of water, 151 generators, 10K blankets, 4.7K cots, 40k tarps; commodities being released to the states in TX & LA for distribution

Declaration Activity:

Amendment No. 2 to FEMA-4332-DR-TX

- Adds 11 counties for Individual Assistance and assistance for debris removal and emergency protective measures (Categories A and B), including direct federal assistance, under the Public Assistance program
- Adds 3 counties for emergency protective measures (Category B), including direct federal assistance, under the Public Assistance program



<u>Tropical Storm Irma</u> (Advisory #3 as of 11:00 p.m. EDT)


- Located 2,245 miles east of San Juan, Puerto Rico
- Moving W at 12 mph
- Maximum Winds: 65 mph
- Forecast to become a Major Hurricane as to continues to move westward toward Puerto Rico

Disturbance 1

- An area of low pressure could form over the southwestern Gulf of Mexico by the weekend
- Development, if any, of this system is expected to be slow to occur as the low moves slowly northward
- This system <u>could</u> bring additional rainfall to portions of the Texas and Louisiana coasts. However, any rainfall forecast is uncertain at this time range and it is too soon to determine any specific impacts
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Low (near 0%)
- Formation chance through 5 days: Low (20%)







Eastern Pacific:

Troical Storm Lidia (Advisory 6A as of 2:00 a.m. EDT)

- Located 150 miles SSE of Cabo San Lucas, Mexico
- Moving NNW at 7 mph
- Sustained winds 40 mph
- No threat to the U.S. or its territories at this time

<u>Central Pacific</u>: No tropical cyclones are expected in the next five days

Western Pacific: No activity threatening U.S. territories
